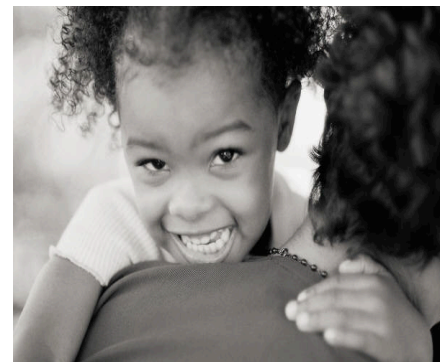


# Texas CHIP Fact Sheet

The Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) was created in 1997 to provide quality health coverage for children in families that earn too much to qualify for Medicaid but are unable to afford coverage in the private market. The Children's Health Insurance Program Reauthorization Act (CHIPRA) of 2009 strengthened the program through increased federal funding, new enrollment and outreach opportunities, and other provisions. In addition, the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (ACA) extended CHIP funding through federal fiscal year (FY) 2015 and required states to maintain eligibility levels through 2019. The ACA also requires states to use the Modified Adjusted Gross Income methodology, which seeks to standardize the calculation of income across insurance affordability programs, including Medicaid, CHIP and the exchanges. States can continue to move forward in covering eligible children by taking advantage of the policies put in place by CHIPRA and the ACA. This fact sheet provides an overview of Texas' CHIP program.<sup>1</sup>



**Name of State's CHIP Program:** [Texas' CHIP](#) operates as a separate CHIP program.

**Number of Children Covered:** In 2011, 562,550 children were covered by Texas' CHIP program.<sup>2</sup>

**Participation Rate:** 77.1% of eligible children in Texas participated in either Medicaid or CHIP in 2009. The national average was nearly 85% in 2009.<sup>3</sup>

**Federal CHIP Match Rate:** 70.75% in FY 2012.<sup>4</sup>

**Eligibility:** 2011 income eligibility levels for Texas CHIP are in the table below.

Income Eligibility Levels for CHIP in Texas (by Age Group) in 2011			
Conception to birth	Younger than age one	Ages one to five	Ages six to 18
Up to 200% FPL	185% to 200% FPL	133% to 200% FPL	100% to 200% FPL

**Dependent Coverage of Public Employees:** Texas began providing federally matched CHIP coverage for school employee dependents September 1, 2010 and to all other state employee dependents September 1, 2011. CHIPRA provided states the option to cover the dependents of state employees.

**Waiting Period Requirement:** Texas requires children to remain uninsured for three months before enrolling in CHIP coverage. Certain exceptions apply.

**Removed Five-Year Waiting Period for Lawfully Residing Children:** Yes, Texas has removed this requirement. CHIPRA provided states the option to remove the five-year waiting period for lawfully residing children.<sup>5</sup>

**Buy-in Option:** Texas does not have a buy-in option. States can allow families with incomes that exceed the upper income eligibility limit to pay the full cost to purchase coverage for their uninsured children through CHIP.<sup>5</sup>

# State CHIP Fact Sheet—Texas

**Efforts to Simplify Enrollment and Renewals:** To reduce barriers to enrollment and renewal in CHIP, states have the option to implement a range of strategies to streamline these processes. The table below describes some of these strategies, specifically those that are considered for CHIPRA performance bonuses. States that have implemented some of the strategies in their Medicaid and/or CHIP programs may qualify for a CHIPRA performance bonus.

Efforts for Simplifying Enrollment and Renewal in CHIP in Texas (as of Dec. 31, 2011)		
Strategy	Explanation	Used in CHIP
Presumptive eligibility	The state allows certain entities to make a preliminary determination and temporarily enroll children in the program who appear to be eligible, pending a full determination of eligibility.	No
No asset test	The state has eliminated the asset or resource test requirement.	No
No in-person interview	The state does not require an in-person interview as part of the application or renewal process.	Yes
Use joint application and renewal forms for Medicaid and CHIP	The state uses the same or interchangeable application and renewal forms for establishing and renewing eligibility.	Yes
Automatic/Administrative renewal	The state uses administrative redetermination (the provision of a pre-populated form with eligibility information along with a notice indicating that eligibility will be continued) or ex parte redetermination (the state renews eligibility based on information contained in the applicant's file or based on other information made available to the state) to renew coverage.	Yes, ex parte renewal
Continuous eligibility for 12 months	The state allows children to retain coverage for 12 months, regardless of whether their family income changes during that time period.	Yes, up to 185% FPL
Express Lane Eligibility	The state uses eligibility determinations from other public programs to determine if a child is eligible.	No
Premium Assistance	The state uses CHIP funds to subsidize the cost of private health insurance coverage for children eligible for the program.	No

**CHIPRA Performance Bonus:** CHIPRA established a performance bonus fund to provide additional federal funding to states that have implemented at least five of the eight enrollment and renewal procedures described above in their Medicaid and/or CHIP programs, and that have achieved a targeted increase in enrollment of children in Medicaid. In 2011, Texas did not qualify for a performance bonus.

## Cost Sharing Requirements:

No premiums. For families earning between 150%-185% FPL, a \$35 enrollment fee; for families earning between 185%-200% FPL, a \$50 enrollment fee.	No	Yes

## Benefits and Delivery System:

- **Same delivery system or provider networks used in Medicaid and CHIP:** No, the Medicaid system uses a fee-for-service and managed care delivery system. The CHIP system has HMO coverage in metropolitan areas and an exclusive provider organization in most rural areas. Many HMOs have contracts in Texas to provide services to both Medicaid and CHIP enrollees.
- **Changes in benefits in 2011:** Yes, CMS approved a state plan amendment to remove treatment limitations from existing CHIP behavioral health benefits to bring the program into compliance with mental health parity requirements in CHIPRA, effective March 1, 2011.
